- Author's name (if given) or use one of the following: Editor, Compiler, Translator (if given)
- Title of the web page (in quotations)
- Title of the overall Web site (italicized)
- Publisher or sponsor of the Web site (Use "N.p." if no publisher or sponsor is found.)
- Date of publication (Use "n.d." if no date is found)
- Publication medium - Web
- Date you accessed the information
- **Only if it would be difficult to find without it**, include the URL of the site (enclosed in angle brackets < >)

*Note:* Many times you will have to consult a web page other than the one you are viewing to identify author, date, and/or page publisher. Examine the "home page" or page just before the one you are viewing. Scroll to the end of the page and see if author and date are given.

### ***Four examples of web page citations***

#### **Author given**

Menand, Louis. "Honest, Decent, Wrong." *The New Yorker*. CondeNet, 27 Jan. 2003. Web. 3 Sep. 2009.

#### **No Author given**

"Greenhouse Gas Emissions." *Climate Change – Greenhouse Gas Emissions*. U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, 15 Apr. 2008. Web. 3 Aug. 2009.

#### **No Author given, no date given**

"Cars, Trucks, & Air Pollution." *Clean Vehicles*. Union of Concerned Scientists, n.d. Web. 3 Aug. 2009.
